INSTRUCTION SHEET:

EIGHTEENTH BAND CAMP

SUBJECT: These several pages contain General Information. Rules. and Procedures relative to the operation of the EIGHTEEN ANNUAL BAND CAMP to be Operated at UMSTEAD STATE PARK beginning on Monday 12 August 74 and running through Thursday 22 August 74.

1. This year's Band Camp will be the EIGHTEENTH year that we have returned to UMSTEAD STATE PARK. Our first camp there was in August 1955 and we have returned every year except two---in 1957 our local V F W sent our band to their Convention in Philadelphia and in 1971 we failed to get our camp application in soon enough to make the proper arrangements.

Prior to our UMSTEAD CAMPS, we held one at Lake Junaluska in 1950, and before that it was Uncle Mile's custom to take the band to the beach each summer for a week. These beach Band Camps were started back in the late 1930 's. The old Nags Header Hotel was the site of several of these early camps.

The beach Band Camps were primarily "vacation camps" and they always began the day after school turned out. But when we started the Umstead camps, we they should be "work-study-training camps". We wanted to use them to get our band and its new members ready for the new school year. So, consequently they have always been held in August just a couple of weeks or so before the beginning of a new school year.

2. UMSTEAD STATE PARK: The Park is located on U S Highway "70" about half way between Raleigh and Durham. It is west of the Crabtree Creek Shopping Center and just east of the Raleigh-Durham Airport.

Our Band Camp is held in the CAMP LAPIHIO secgion of the Park. This is the largest of the several "group camp"areas.

- 3. BY-PASS RAIEIGH TO BAND CAMP: As you approach Raleigh from the east on U S Highway "64" take the U S Highway "1" BY-PASS. Stay on the By-Pass for several miles until you come to the AIRPORT EXIT. Take the Exit to the Right, that will put you on U S Highway 1701 headed west toward Durham. After eight miles or so you should notice some Umstead State Park signs. Get in the LEFT LANE and prepare to leave the highway to the left.
- 4. OUR MAILING ADDRESS: Mail is always welcomed by people in camp, so write to them as follows: "the name of the person to whom you are writing" Northeastern High School Band (or N H S Band) Umstead State Park (Iapihio) Route 8, Box 130 Raleigh, N. C. 27612
- 5. TELEPHONE COMMUNICATION: In cases of EMERGENCY we can be reached by telephone through the Park Superintendant, Mr MYERS BRAXTON. His telephone number is through Raleigh. You may dial 1-787-3033. A Park Ranger will deliver any urgent message immediately even though we are two or three miles from his office.

SUBJECT: Information on the Purposes, Objects, and Fees for Band Camp.

- 7. OUR BAND CAMP: Starting with our Umstead Band Camps back in 1955, we have made it a point to operate our Band Camp as a school function. School rules and Regulations are observed at all times. Every aspect of our Band Camp is operated with the highest regard for the health, the safety, and the welfare of every member of our band.
- 8. PURPOSE OF BAND CAMP: The primary purpose of all the Band Camps we've had at Umstead has been to re-organize and train our Band for the new school year. Our school and our community have always expected a lot of our Band. Consequently, it should behoove us to take full advantage of the opportunities available to us through the privilege of having a Band Camp. Very few Bands anywhere enjoy this unusual privilege? And the only real way we can show our true appreciation for this rare privilege is by what we do with the opportunities Band Camp offers us?

It is true that our Band Camps offer many students their ONLY vacation away from home and away from their parents (and this is good for both students and parents?). Band Camp offers opportunities for fellowship, plenty of fresh air, lôts of physical activities, and thirty of the best meals to be had anywhere at any price? The environment is so different from ours here in Elizabeth City—it is a welcomed change for the ten days we are there. But probably one of the best things of all about Band Camp is that it gets about a hundred high school students all set, primed, and ready for a new school year?

9. BAND MEMBERS ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND: Since Band Camp is primarily for getting our Band ready for a new school year, it naturally follows that all the members must be present and participating. We not only work on getting INDIVIDUALS ready, we get the WHOLE BAND READY, and to do either requires all to be present:

We spend a great deal of time working on fundamentals—fundamentals of playing and fundamentals of marching. And there's no question about Band Camp giving us the time and opportunity to memorize a lot of the music we use during football season. But it doesn't stop with football season, it shows up in the quality of our band all year long!

Really though, attendance to Band Camp long ago ceased to be a problem. Today students just seem to want to go to Band Camp. They look forward to it. Many later look back on Band Camp and the high-light of their band years? We've never had a more disappointed group of students than three years ago when we were not able to have a Band Camp?

A few may be concerned about their jobs. The dates for Band Camp are always announced months ahead, just so plan s and schedules can be worked out. We trust that students will be honest with their employers and let them know about Band Camp. It is not fair to try to have your cake and eat it too? Our rule is that Band Camp is for the whole band, not just for those who want to attend. A lot of time, effort, and money goes into our Band Camps, It should deserve reasonable dedication and sacrifice on the part of those who claim membership in our band.

10. BAND CAMP FEE: Our Band Camp Fee is \$25.00 which it has been for a number of years. This fee covers a little less than half of the cost of operating the camp for each student:

THE BAND CAMP FEE IS DUE NOW. You should pay your fee to Mrs Reid not later than rehearsal Thursday night, August 8th. If there is any problem, let Mrs Reid know about it ahead of time? And remember, if you are paying by check, please make it payable to: NORTHEASTERN HIGH SCHOOL BAND.

SUBJECT: Information on Personal Bags, Baggage, Clothing, Etc.

11. BAGGAGE ALLOWANCE: Each student has the choice of taking his personal things in a footlocker or in two suitcases. And, if you desire, you may also take along with you a small bag or case such as a zipper bag, a train case, tote-bag, or very very small suit-case for your personal articles.

If you choose to carry a FOOTLOCKER, it must be at the Band Studio by NOON Friday so that it can be loaded on the truck which will leave

for Band Camp early Saturday morning!

If you choose to carry TWO SUIT-CASES, they may be brought on Saturday morning so that they can be loaded on the buses to go with us on Monday morning.

The zipper bags or train cases etc with your personal articles should be brought with you on Monday morning. You are to personally put this bag on the bus you will be riding on. Put it on the bus after you arrive on Monday morning.

DO NOT go out and buy a new footlocker or new suitcases. We are going to camp and we will be moving quite a number of bags. We do all we can to t try to protect them. But as hard as we try, we cannot prevent scratches and other minor damage. We prefer you take old suitcases and lockers?

- 12. IDENTIFY ALL PERSONAL BEIONGINGS: Each student should have his name on EVERY ARTICLE he carries. This means on sheets, pillows, wash-cloths, towels, flashlights, raincoats, etc. PUT YOUR NAME ON EVERYTHING! This is to help us help you keep up with the things you lay down some place and forget where you put them? It is also used to deter sticky fingers and people who every now and then like to take and use somebody else's property!
- 13. TAG YOUR BAGGAGE: When you bring your things to the Band Studio, we want you to tie a COLORED tag on each of your bags. We will furnish the tags and string:

If you are staying in Area "A", the a WHITE TAG on your things If you are staying in Area "B", tie a YELLOW TAG on your bags If you are staying in Area "C", tie a RED TAG on your things

If you are staying in Area "D", tie a BLUE TAG on your things.

If you don't make a mistake in the use of these colored tags, you will find your things already delivered to your Area and a lot of them will be on the porch to your cabin; No tag will mean they will be help in the Mess Hall Area and you will have to carry them to your cabin?

On the tag write you: NAME and CABIN No.

Roll your blanket or quilt around your pillow and sheets etc and slip the whole bundle into a LAUNDRY BAG or similar type bag. Bring to the Band Studio by FRIDAY NOON so they can be loaded to leave here early Saturday morning. TIE THE BUNDLE VERY SECURELY and don't forget to put a COLORED TAG on it? You may be able to carry your raincoat and perhaps other soft and light articles inside this roll. But remember, nothing heavy or hard!

YOUR DRESS FOR TRIP TO BAND CAMP: For your trip to Band Camp on Monday you 15. should dress in school clothes or in some of your nicer band camp clothes. Don't buy anything new! However we do want you to look nice, clean, and neat, and well groomed! We will be stopping once between here and Band Camp for a REST/SNACK STOP. 3

18. CHECK LIST FOR CABINS: Each cabin should have certain items and several students in each cabin should decide who will take each of these items:

two wind-up ALARM CLOCKS (be sure they'll wake you up!)

who two clothes lines to hang your washing on there should be a mirrow or two for each cabin maybe an electric iron to each girls cabin a battery radio or tape player---one ought to be enough for each cabin. Be sure it has a cut-off button and that you know how to cut it off. It GOES OFF AT TAPS!

light Jacket or Sweater for the cool nights

- 19. PERSONAL PHONO RECORDS: Some of you may want to bring your favorite records to be used at some of our dances. You pack them and bring whem with your personal things. Be sure that YOUR NAME IS ON THEM? We want you to be sure that you get them back.
- 20. DON'T TAKE ANYTHING YOU DON'T REALLY NEED: We have very very good meals and theres always plenty. So please don't carry any food such as candy, cookies, potato chips——you'll need such things about like an eskimo needs snow! There's no need for you carrying an emergency supple of drinks, especially soft drinks——ten days without them might even improve your health. Food and drink should be the least of your worries at Band Camp!

Otherwise, I must inform those who have never been to Band Camp that we have no place in our program for smoking and that means cigarettes and any of the other matter that some people smoke these days! If perchance we have somebody among us that's beginning to develop a need for alcho hol, Band Camp is not for them! We want our students to have a good time and to enjoy Band Camp and I would like to enjoy it too, but I cannot tolerate smoking, drinking, ungly talk, dirty jokes, and disrespect. So if this kind of behavior tends to to the habitual liking of any of my students, then they have no business going to Band Camp or belonging to the Band! 4

SUBJECT: Information relaltive to General Welfare.

- 21. MEDICAL CONSENT FORM: For several years we have been having the parents of the students to to sign and return to us a "MEDICAL CONSENT FORM". This form has been developat the request of and after consultation with the officials of REX GENERAL HOSPITAL in Raleigh and with the Insurance Company that covers our students. Basically, the object is to give permission to the Hospital to give treatment when we take a student to the Emergency Room. If there is a serious accident the Doctors would call the parents before any unusual or serious treatment would be given. These forms will be sent home by students tonight and they should bring them back tomorrow or Thursday. At anyrate we must have them with us at Band Camp.
- 22. INSURANCE: Every person going to Band Camp will be covered for his stay at Band Camp with camp insurance. The Band will pay for this insurance and it will be for the duration of Band Camp only.
- 23. PERSONAL MONEY: Every student should take a few dollars to Band Camp for Church, souvenirs, refreshments on trips to town etc. On the otherhand it is not necessary for anyone to have money since we furnish everything that a student really needs. Taking personal money is a personal thing. \$5.00 or \$6.00 should be plenty and it would be foolish to carry more than \$10.00 unless there is an agreement at home for the specific purchase of some article that will require the extra money. Just don't take any more money than you really need!
- 24. THE BAND BANK: For many years our Band has operated what we call a <u>Band Bank</u> at our Band Camps an on other long trips. Each student deposits his money in the Band Bank until he needs it. When we go to town, each student is privileged to check out what every amounts he feels he will need in town.

 The whole idea is to cut down the number of students who lose their money or leave it carelessly around for someone to pick it up or steal it. We arge all students to take advantage of our Band Bank and help us reduce the temptations and carelessness.
- 25. DISCIPLINE: Our Band has no rules here at home, on trips, at Band Camp, or where ever we might be except those b ased on COMMON SENSE, GOOD MANNERS, RESPECTFUL CONDUCT, and MORAL DECENCY: We recognize that EVERYONE has some PERSONAL RIGHTS and that at times EVERYONE is entitled to certain PERSONAL PRIVILEGES and that among these should be reasonable amounts of PRIVACY: We want every single one of our band members to personally see to it that he does his part to GUARANTEE these RIGHTS and PRIVILEGES to EVERYONE EISE:

IF A PERSON WANTS TO BE RESPECTED, HE MUST FIRST RESPECT OTHERS!

A good starting point would be to try to respect everybody, but a determined effort should be made to respect all those charged with trying to make our Band Camp work! This means that a determined effort should be made to respect our Band Officers and the adults in camp with us—after all we just absolutely could not have a Band Camp without them! The Officers have a job to do, they have duties and responsibilities assigned to them. They must carry out these assignments—it is not a choice matter. At best the jobs the Officers have to do are going to be difficult, so don't go around being thoughtless and making their jobs harder!

Just make it a point to be pleasant to anyone you are close to. If you just must be unpleasant, get off by yourself until it's over. Go about about your business with an attitude of working at having a good time and trying to help others have a good time. WE WANT NO TROUBLE, SO PLEASE DON'T GO ABOUT MAKING TROUBLE:

SUBJECT: Information on Camp Areas, Cabins, Visitors etc.

42. CAMP AREAS: As stated previously, our Band Camp is staged in the LAPIHIO section of UMSTEAD PARK, Camp Lapihio is divided into four different areas. We have arbitrarily chosen to call these: AREA "A", AREA "B", AREA "C", and AREA "D", The girls are assigned to Areas "A" and "B". And the boys to "O" and "D".

Each area consits of 7 Cabins and a washhouse/toilet building. Further Areas "B" and "C" have a larger building called a "LODGE". Usually the Majorettes occupy the Lodge in Area "B" and some of the Officers bccupy

the Lodge in Area "O".

The Girl's Areas "A" and "B" and the Boys Areas "C" and "D" are always OFF-LIMITS to each other except during "Free-Time" from 5:00 to 6:15 PM each day. This rule is our way of GUARANTEEING a certain amount of PRI-VACY to each of our students? I would like very much for every student to have a reasonable amount of privacy. I feel that every one of us to have the PRIVILEGE of taking a BATH or DRESSING without being embarassed by the PRESENCE of SOMEONE in our area WHO SHOULD NOT BE THERE!

CABINS: Each one of the cabins is designed for four cots with the exception 43. of the one "I" shaped cabin in each area. There should be 3 cots in the "L" shaped cabins.

There should be at least two students in each cabin (we will permit no one to be alone). On the other hand we will not permit more than four in any cabin, with the exception of the Lodges. Students have the privilege of chosing their own cabin mates as far as possible and also chosing their cabin as far as possible.

There must be no switching from cabin to cabin or even just over-night visiting. We want to know and we MUST where every student is at all times. From 11:15 PM until 7:15 AM each student had better bw in the cabin he

signed up for?

- 44. CABIN INSPECTIONS: For several years our Chaperons have made daily inspections of all the Cabins. Each Cabin is graded and the scores are posted daily. Competition is usually very keen and the Cabins are amazingly well kept: All parents should see them? The students are to be commended?
- 45. VISITORS: We have always encouraged parents to visit us at Band Camp. Until you have actually been there and observed the goings-on, the rehearsals, the drills, the daily routines, the meals, everything --- well, you just don't really know much about Band Camp until you have actually been there! We usually have quite a large crowd to visit us on Saturday and sometimes a tremendous crowd on Sunday. You are invited to come, but just let . us know so our fabulous Kitchen Staff will be able to prepare the right amount of food; Our only regret is that we can't guarantee you a place to stay at night --- if we have a place, you are welcome. Most parents choose to stay at the RANCH MOTEL (phone 1-787-3131) on Highway "70" between Umstead and Raleigh.
- 46. TEENAGE VISITORS: We really don't mind having teenage visitors who are friends of band members visit us, but we want them to realize our students have obligations and responsibilities and we really don't want their presence to interfere with our schedules and work.

Really though, we don't expect any more of our visitors than we expect of our own students, and generally that amounts to RESPONSIBLE CONDUCT,

GOOD MANNERS, EXEMPLARY BEHAVIOUS, and DECENT LANGUAGE.

SUBJECT: Daily Camp Schedule, Park Gate Schedule, Etc.

- 48. PARK GATE SCHEDULE: Umstead Park opens its gates to visitors each morning at 8:00. The gates are closed and locked at 9:00 each evening. We hope all our visitors are aware of this schedule so that they will not be locked in the Park.
- 49. SETTING UP THE CAMP CREW: It is not an easy job to turn a quiet forest into an active loud noicy Band Camp. A lot of work and effort goes into the planning and final movement of all our equipment, instruments, supplies, etc. to Umstead. For years this job has been under the direction of Mr OSCAR HOBBS of the Norfolk and Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company. Going up with Mr Hobbs will be Mr Clinton Saunders, Mr Garland Sanders, Mr James Reid, Mr Jimmy Rogerson, Mr Paige Harris, and Mr Iarry Williams. Graduates going to help will be Steve Berry, Archie Newby, Craig Hall, Jim Anderson, Billy Albert, and perhaps 3 or 4 others.
- 50. OTHER THINGS TO BRING WITH YOU MONDAY: When you report to the Band Studio Monday at 7:30 AM, be sure you have with you your zipper bag-train case etc. You personally place this bag on the bus you will be riding. Further, if you play Flute, Clarinet, Bassoon, Oboe, Alto Clarinet, Alto Saxophone, Tenor Saxophone, Cornet Trumpet you personally put your own instrument on the bus you will be riding. All the larger instruments etc will be packed on the Equipment Truck on Friday for trip to Umstead on Saturday.
- 51. A FINAL NOTE: Last year we had an outstanding group of students who determined they wanted an outstanding band——we now know that they succeeded. This year we are looking forward to another year with another group of students with very nearly the same potential. As far as I am personally concerned you can do the same bang up job? It is pretty much what you make up your minds to do. If you don't mind hard work and you make up your minds that you want nothing leass than another year like last year, YOU'LL HAVE IT?

 Let's get on with it and DON'T LOOK BACK UNTIL NEXT JUNE?
